# **Old Battery Lane Project Continues**



As many of you have undoubtedly noticed, two restored historical duplexes (four housing units) now stand ready on Old Battery Lane.

The next phase of the ongoing construction project involves installing new water and sewer lines to all four units. This process is scheduled to begin next week with the installation of

environmental controls for the site. We don't anticipate any road closures or major disruptions during this phase of the project, but please be on the lookout for increased activity in that area.

Unfortunately, trees will need to be removed during this phase. Our policy is to plant two new trees for every one that needs to be taken down and to only plant native species.

This remains a vital part of our ongoing commitment to the environment at beautiful Fort DuPont State Park.
