FDRPC Awarded Grant to Support Theater Restoration



Fort DuPont Redevelopment & Preservation Corp. has received a \$5,000 grant from the National Trust for Historic Preservation to help fund a design study for the historic War Department Theater, built in 1933.

The project will evaluate the building's condition, explore design and reuse plans, and generate community discussion on the theater's restoration. This work is the first step toward reviving the theater as a cultural and community venue.

Tim Slavin, executive director of Fort DuPont Redevelopment and Preservation Corporation, said of the grant, "As a small organization with a big vision, receiving support from the National Trust for Historic Preservation is an incredible honor. This grant represents national recognition for our very own War Department Theater—a place with deep roots in Delaware City's history. We're grateful for this opportunity and excited to take the first step in bringing the theater back to life as a vibrant space for community, culture, and connection."

This project was funded in part by a grant from the National Trust Preservation Fund of the National Trust for Historic Preservation.


